

Dear Friends,

New Year's Day heralds a fresh year, although it's just another day in reality. Over thousands of years human beings have tried to make sense and order of our lives through calendars. We impose

our own framework on the world, but calendars and dates are quite arbitrary and subjective. There's nothing magic about a new year, the change of a number, except this does give us something we can measure our lives against.

Sun and the Moon have been used in different cultures and civilisations over the millennia to establish a 'new year'. In Britain, the legal year traditionally started on the 25th March, Lady Day (the Feast of the Annunciation to Mary).
